MAD ABOUT MADS

I remember when the 1955,'56,and '56 Chevy's came out, the all new look. The dealers liked to keep everyone in suspense until the unveiling. They had them in the show room covered for about two weeks before the exciting day. We went down to see them at Daniels Chevrolet in Colorado Springs, CO. There were lots of people looking and I imagine they sold several. There was 4 dr. sedan, turquoise and white, a 4 dr. station wagon, two tone green and a yellow and white 2 dr. hdt., , they sure were pretty. (no Nomads until later) We couldn't even think about buying a new car, we were driving a 1948 Plymouth that had belonged to my dad. Every year we would look at the new ones coming out and drool.

My son, Cliff was born in 1955 and when we was 17 he bought his first car a 1956 2 dr. post. It was \$255, he had been saving money out of what little he made stuffing newspapers, and bought it, he was so proud of it. It wasn't very pretty, but he worked on it ,and it needed a lot, painted it and made it look pretty nice for his first paint job. His dad, my first husband, died of leukemia in 1973, so he never was able to help him much with the car and never saw the Nomad.

About a year later Cliff saw a '55 Nomad advertised in the paper, he went to look at it, and that is what he thought he had to have. He sold the '56 to his friend, borrowed a little more and bought it for \$750. He and his friend worked to restore it the way a 17 year old boy would like it, tunnel ram, 4 speed Hurst shifter, and painted it metallic blue, he drove it around with pride. He really thought that was neat to have a car the same year as he was and said he was going to keep it just to show his kids, but that didn't happen, people do change their minds.

His love for the Nomad ended when he fell for a 1969 Z-28 Camaro in 1975, not wanting him to sell it, I bought it and here is where I really got my start with Nomads. Cliff passed away in 1982 with Hodgkins disease, he never was able to finish his Camaro, his friend, Curt got it and finished restoring it, he has shown it numerous times. He calls it "Reality". Under the hood he had painted "Cliffs Dream", Curts Reality".

I took the Nomad to Vail, CO in 1976 to the National Nomad Convention. When I saw how some of them looked I decided it was time to do my restoration.

By that time I was dating my future hisband Jim. I had the interior reupolstered and took it to a friend of a friend to have it painted. I told him there was no hurry,don't do this, big mistake. July 1978 about two years later ,I got it back the day before we were to leave for the convention. Jim and I were married in the morning(he said he guessed the only way to get a Nomad was to marry one) and in the afternoon we went to pick up the Nomad. It was painted pearl white on the top and '72 Corvette blue on the bottom, with an

owl airbrushed on the dash and pinstriped butterflies on the roof support and front fenders. It really looked pretty. We spent most of the night putting chrome and other parts back on it so it would be ready to drive the next morning, an exciting way to spend our wedding night, but at that point we were excited that we were going to be on our way to the convention and our honeymoon.

We caravaned with other members of our local club to Casper, WY. We enjoyed the show very much dispite the hail storm that came through, some sustained damage but we were lucky, we were on the side of the motel away from the storm and we escaped with only a wet interior.

Some time later when I had the Nomad in car show I was talking to a gentleman and he told me he had a 1956 Nomad and that he thought he wanted to sell it and asked if I knew anyone interested, Sure I thought, most people think they have a Nomad and it turns out to be just another wagon. I didn't think much about it until I got home and talked to Jim about it and decided to see it, sure enough it was a Nomad. We purchased it the same day November 8, 1983.

It didn't need too much, except engine work to be able to drive it and I took It to the Rapid City convention, (Jim had to work and didn't get to go). My daughter and son-in-law drove the '55 and I drove the "56. I was impressed with the original 3 speed overdrive and 265 engine, it got 26 mpg, but it hasn't done that well since, about 22 mpg.

At first, we thought since there were already some modifications was to change the color and do some other things. The more we thought about it and looked at the Nassau Blue/Harbour Blue combination, there wasn't a lot to do to put it back to original. The previous owner had put bucket seats in and different wheels. I had a set of stock wheels, but finding the original bench seat was a little more difficult. We got an original interior uplostery kit and had it installed, and it sure began to look nice.

Our next show was the Reno, NV convention, neither of us had been to Reno so we thought, why not? We took both Nomads, a friend and his wife drove the '55 and another couple also went. To our surprise we took 1st place with the '56, but there were only 2 cars in the class.

We had to have wheel bearings put on the '55 before coming back, its a wonder we ever made it that far, we went to the Ponderose Ranch and when we came down that hill and stopped at the bottom the fluid was running out. When we were in Wells, NV on the way home the axle bearings went out on the '55, so we spent two nights there waiting for some parts come before we could go on. We had fun anyway, was a casino there with a good show and the motel was only \$20 a night.

We had trouble with the '56 vapor locking on the way out of Salt Lake City, had to pour water on the fuel pump about every mile(thankfully we took 4 gallons with us). We got as far as Vernal, UT put on an electric fuel pump which helped with the problem, glad there was someone with us who could do it.

We decided it would look much better if it was repainted, the bumpers rechromed, and everything else it needed. Wehad that done and took it to the convention in Oklahoma City in 1992. It rained hard the night before the judging and we found out they had not put the weatherstrip in right over the doors and the car was full of water. We dried it out the best we could and put it in the judging, which was delayed so things could dry out some. We were lucky to take a second place. The one that won was beautiful.

We have taken our Nomads to many local and regional shows and took first and second place awards.

Twenty years after our honeymoon and the convention in Casper we celebrated our 20th wedding anniversary, and guess what? at another Nomad convention, this one in Frisco, CO in 1998. We only took 3rd. place there. We enjoyed the convention and our anniversary there, love does strange things whether with cars or people.

We moved to Oklahoma in 1999, and I lost Jim on July 13, 2001, the day after our 23rd wedding anniversary. It's been hard as we had so much fun with our cars, but I have a lot of good memories. I haven't gone to any of the conventions since, as I have had lots of health problems myself. Thats what happens when you get old, I've been at this a long time, over 30 years.

About time to go to some event I was having some kind of surgery, the last one was for the rotator cuff in my right arm. It was doing pretty well when a car rear ended me (not in the Nomad, a company car I was driving) and tore it all loose, so with having put on radial tires it has been too hard to steer and shift, At the present time it is at Larry Myers getting power steering, auto transmisson, vintage air, and disk brakes. The factory original A/C just doesn't do the job here in the Oklahoma heat,, so I'm looking forward to driving it again soon. I really had to think long and hard before I wanted to give up the all original it was forever, but I decided if I'm going to drive it I have to do somehting, so this is it.

Over the years we also had a 1955 4 dr. wagon, a 1956 4 dr. hdt, and a 1957 2 dr. hdt. original unrestored. Have sold all of these, and I hated to see everyone of them go, they have been part of my life for so many years


